### Staging requirements

Exhibitors are requested to name exhibits, if possible.

Spikes and individual blooms to be staged one per container, unless otherwise stated.

Individual blooms of bearded iris are to sit neatly on the rim of the container.

### Definition of terms used in the schedule

Standard - The three upper petals of the flower.

Falls - The three lower petals of the flower.

Amoena - White or near white standards, coloured falls.

Blend - Two or more colours

Neglecta - Light blue standards, darker blue falls.

Plicata - Petals light coloured, falls &/or standards edged or stippled with darker colour.

Self -All petals one solid colour, not necessarily including the beard.

Variegata -Yellow standards, brown, purple or violet falls.

**For Classes 1, 2, 3 and 4 staging time is by 9.00am.**

**Entries in these classes will be restricted to one per exhibitor.**

### 1. Bearded Iris Championship

Six units, distinct cultivars- consisting of three spikes and three individual blooms.
