Green two-piece vases will be available. Exhibitors <u>are to use them</u> for both specialist and general flowers where practicable, unless otherwise stated. (See Show Rule 15)

The naming of blooms is desirable in all classes. Under the standards, exhibits can be penalized for unnamed blooms. If the name is not known, label "unknown" or "name wanted" should be used.

Naming

The naming of blooms by cultivar before judging in classes 1 to 5 is compulsory and is desirable in other classes. Under the standards, exhibits can be penalized for unnamed blooms. If the name is not known, label "unknown" or "name wanted".

Varieties/ types 160mm and over - 1 to a vase

Varieties/ types under 160mm - 3 of one variety to a vase

Staging requirements

Standard Units:

All blooms 160mm and over to be staged one per vase.

All blooms under 160mm to be staged three per vase - unless otherwise stated.

Champion awards are to be conferred only upon vases consisting of a single variety.

All dahlias are to be staged with a combined stem & stalk with at least 160mm protruding from the vase to the point of attachment to the bloom for all types.

Decorative classes may include formal, informal or semi-decorative types unless otherwise stated. Cactus Classes may include cactus or semi-cactus types unless otherwise stated.

The naming of blooms before judging in classes 80, 81, 82 & 83 is compulsory and is desirable in other classes. Under the standards, exhibits can be penalised for unnamed blooms. If the name is not known, label should read 'unknown ' or 'name wanted'.

Staging Requirements

With the exception of class 82, Exhibition blooms must be staged one to a container without added foliage (i.e. No loose or extra foliage is allowed) and blooms must be at least 150mm above the top of the container.

The wiring of roses is not permitted.

Full bloom roses must show stamens or centre and be staged in one container.
